Pandemic Update

Our current training offerings continue to be limited as we abide by council limits on group gatherings, council-run activities, and overnight camping. These limits are based on state and local restrictions. They continue to be evaluated as the pandemic situation evolves.

Here are a few key points to know:

- We encourage everyone to take as much training as they can get online. It's available 24/7 at https://my.scouting.org.
 - If you need to renew your Youth Protection Training (YPT), this is the way to do it.
 - You can complete Position-Specific Training (for the "Trained" patch) for almost every Scouting position through BSA online.
- We're also running local webinars. Our volunteer trainers are continuing to run a series of online training sessions on various topics of interest. Please see the calendar at right, and check the weekly Mayflower Council email for additions to the list.
- 3. BALOO training continues to be a challenge.
 BALOO training (overnight camping skills) is still required if you take Cub Scouts camping. We know of several packs who have been held back by this rule because we haven't been able to run BALOO training since late 2019. We understand and share your frustration. We've looked into various possibilities for waivers and workarounds, but the National office's policies have not changed. Our current plan is to attempt to run BALOO in some form (if it can be allowed) in early spring 2021.
- 4. First aid training options may be available soon. We are evaluating first aid certification options as the American Red Cross (our training partner) continues to update its options for class structure and format. Please stay tuned for more details!

Renew Youth Protection Training

Time is running out to renew your Youth Protection Training (YPT)! All registered adult leaders must have current YPT status in order to recharter with a pack, troop, or crew for 2021. A large percentage of leaders last took YPT during 2018, which means the 2-year training has expired or is about to expire. The only way to renew this training right now is at https://my.scouting.org. You only need to take the "mandatory" version (it says it's a bit more than 1 hour), but you do need to make sure you do all four parts (three modules plus the quiz).

Den Chief Training on December 19

A Den Chief is a Scouts BSA (or Venturing) member who helps lead activities with a Cub Scout den. We call it a "win-win-win-win": the older youth gets a confidence-building leadership experience, the Cub Scouts get a role model who can inspire them to grow in Scouting, the pack gets a valuable helping hand, and the troop gets a recruiter. That's why we encourage every Cub Scout pack to connect with local troops and recruit Den Chiefs!

By popular demand, we'll be running a custom webinar version of **Den Chief Training** on **Saturday morning**, **December 19**, **9:00–11:30 AM**. This training will focus on the roles and responsibilities of a Den Chief, tips and techniques for success, and activity ideas and practice. The BSA already offers online training at www.scouting.org/training/youth/den-chief-training, which can be a useful introduction for any Den Chief. Our session will provides the same "basic training" credit, but it also includes the opportunity to interact with other people, ask questions, and discuss practical tips—including ideas for how to be an effective Den Chief during COVID. We wish we could do it in person, but we'll try our best to capture some of the same fun online!

Tips For Taking Youth Protection Training Online!

Learning Plan

Total time: 72 minutes

Description

The safety and well-being of our youth is of paramount importance to our organization, and integral to everything we do. We must continue our commitment to providing a safe and secure environment at all times for all our youth members. After completing all three modules and passing the exam, it may take up to 24 hours to see your certificate in My.Scouting.

Overview And Policies V2 — total time: 24m

This module will help you to recognize, respond and report the different kinds of abuse experienced by youth. Importantly, you will also know the barriers to abuse and how to utilize them to help create a safe space for youth. After completing all three modules and passing the exam, it may take up to 24 hours to see your certificate in My.Scouting.org

Sexual Abuse V2 - total time: 25m

Child sexual abuse is considered a public health concern by experts and health organizations. This module covers the different types of sexual abuse. After completing all three modules and passing the exam, it may take up to 24 hours to see your certificate in My.Scouting.org

Bullying V2 — total time: 13m


Bullying is any unwanted, aggressive behavior by an adult, a youth, or a group that involves an observed or perceived power imbalance and is repeated or is likely to be repeated multiple times. This module covers various forms of bullying. After completing all three modules and passing the exam, it may take up to 24 hours to see your certificate in My.Scouting.org

YPT Certification Test V2 — total time: 10m


This exam must be passed with a 75% or better passing criteria along with the other mandatory modules to receive credit for the YPT course. After completing all three modules and passing the exam, it may take up to 24 hours to see your certificate in My.Scouting.org

Pandemic Update

Mayflower Council suspended all in-person training courses in the spring. We'd love to be back out there delivering in-person training sessions all across the council now, but until the pandemic is under control, we're operating in a modified capacity to minimize risk to our participants, our trainers, and their families.

Right now, we offer two main avenues for training:

- Online training from the BSA: It's available 24/7 at https://my.scouting.org. We know it's not as interactive as in-person training, but it's the most convenient option. Right now, it's also the safest.
 - If you need to renew your Youth Protection Training (YPT), this is the way to do it.
 - You can complete Position-Specific Training (for the "Trained" patch) for almost every Scouting position through BSA online.
- Local webinars: Our volunteer trainers are continuing to run a series of online training sessions. Please see the calendar at right, and check the weekly Mayflower Council news email for additions to the list. These sessions include:
 - "Live" versions of certain Position-Specific Training courses. For example, we'll run basic training for Cub Scout leaders this fall. It's a good way to (virtually) meet fellow leaders, share ideas, and be able to ask questions.
 - Webinars on other timely topics of interest (see "Scoutbook" training, for example).

There are a few things we can't do. For example, National does not allow us to create our own "webinar" versions of IOLS, BALOO, or YPT. IOLS and BALOO are outdoor camping skills courses where it's just not possible to achieve the learning objectives without a hands-on outdoor component. As for first aid training, we follow the policies of the American Red Cross, which still requires in-person skill verification to get (re)certified.

We <u>are</u> investigating whether we can run IOLS or BALOO later this fall. Obviously there would be many modifications in terms of numbers, facilities, equipment, and group teaching to be able to do it safely. A team of volunteers is currently reviewing whether it's possible to do this while staying true to the goals and requirements of the training. We're also following news from National (which is testing an IOLS "hybrid" course) and other nearby councils (some have canceled altogether; others are trying to plan limited fall offerings). We appreciate everyone's patience and understanding as we try to fulfill our mission without putting people at risk.

Changes to My.Scouting Interface... But Records Have Not Been Lost!

In late spring, the BSA rolled out some changes to the way you find training courses on My. Scouting. The point of this reorganization was to group individual training segments into a "learning plan" for each position, make it easier to find segments you still need to take (for example, Hazardous Weather isn't hidden in a different place like it used to be), and have credit carry over so you don't have to take the same segment twice for two different positions.

Many Scouters noticed that after this change, their "learning plans" did not list all their previous completions. We heard a lot of questions and concerns about this. Our contacts at National confirmed that this is a known problem, and they were not able to transfer all those completions when they made the switch. **But there's good news!** The training you took in the past <u>will</u> still show up on your official record—which is what really counts. Here's how to check your official record:

- Go to https://my.scouting.org.
- 2. From the menu, choose "My Training."
- 3. Click "Completions."

We checked this for everyone who asked, and the official records still looked complete. The main case where this won't work is if you have two different My. Scouting accounts or member IDs that still need to be merged.

This course covers the same material as the version at https://my.scouting.org , but doing it together means we can have more useful interaction and discussion. We'll also share ideas for teaching merit badges online during the pandemic. At the end of this course, you'll be trained for your position and entitled to wear the "Trained" patch.
Tuesday, May 12, 2020 7:00-8:00 PM Register	Intro to ILST	Scoutmasters, ASMs, SPLs, and ASPLs	Introduction to Leadership Skills (ILST) for Troops is the first stage of the Scouts BSA youth leadership training program. It's designed to be taught within each troop, led by the Scoutmaster and SPL. This course (also called "Junior Leader Training" and many other things through the years) sets your Patrol Leaders and other youth leaders up to succeed by helping them understand their roles and responsibilities in running a youth-led troop.
			Our one-hour webinar on May 12 is *not* the actual ILST course (the actual ILST is 4 to 5 hours of material, and it should be taught within your troop). But it *is* an opportunity for Scoutmasters, ASMs, and top youth leaders (SPL, ASPL) to learn more about ILSTI We'll talk about the course materials, suggest resources, and share examples and tips from troops about when and where to run ILST and how to make it successful and fun. If you'd like to "up your game" on youth leader training, join us on May 12!

In Part 2 we'll split into breakout sessions with more detailed topics for each position (Den Leader, Cubmaster, Pack Committee). We'll also come together to talk about ways to build stronger dens and packs with active programming and family involvement.
Sunday, May 31, 2020 7:00-9:00 PM	14112512		We're offering Part 2 twice to make sure to provide an extra opportunity for anyone who can't make it on May 24. Also, if you want to get trained for more than one position, you can attend on both May 24 and May 31 and join a different breakout group each time.

What About Other Training Courses?

Adult leaders can still take many training courses available on demand from the BSA at https://my.scouting.org. Scouts BSA and Venturing youth can take Den Chief training online at www.scouting.org/training/youth/den-chief-training. We normally run in-person versions of many of these courses, but some are hard to deliver well in a custom webinar. For example, our in-person Den Chief course focuses on hands-on group activities (crafts, wide games, role plays), and it's hard to do this well online. For this reason and others, we encourage you to take the standard BSA training for now.

A few other training courses like BALOO, IOLS, and Wilderness/Remote First Aid require a lot of physical hands-on skill practice. It's just not possible to meet the learning objectives effectively in a virtual setting. Regrettably, this means we can't offer these training courses right now. We look forward to offering live courses again when it's safe to do so!

What Else Can I Do From Home?

- Renew Youth Protection Training (YPT)! This two-hour training expires every two years. If you've been registered
 as a leader for a while, chances are you took it in 2018 when the BSA made everyone take the new course. That
 means you need to retake it in 2020. Get it done! Visit https://my.scouting.org.
- Take other position-specific training (PST) online. If you're a Cub Scout leader (any position), Troop Committee
 member, Merit Badge Counselor, or many other positions, you can complete basic training for your position at
 https://my.scouting.org. See the requirements to be https://my.scouting.org.
- Fix your training records! Some old courses may be missing, especially for longtime Scouters. Log into
 https://my.scouting.org to check your training completions. If something is missing, please contact your district
 training chair or the council training chair (see below) to start. We generally ask for proof via certificate or course
 director confirmation.
- Earn a training knot! See application forms with requirements at www.scouting.org/training/adult.aspx (scroll down to "Training Awards"). Forms can be signed electronically or scanned and emailed to awards@mayflowerbsa.org. From there, they'll be routed to your district training chair for approval.

March is "Fix Your Training Record" Month

The records show that about half of our volunteers aren't fully trained for their Scouting positions... but we know more than a few people have courses missing from their records. This could happen for many reasons: a longtime volunteer who got trained before the BSA started putting these things in a database, a course you took recently that never got reported, training you took before you were a registered leader (so we couldn't give you credit at the time), etc. Whatever the reason, this can be fixed!

This month, let's work together to clean up all those old missing records so you can get credit and we can stop nagging you about training you've already taken!

Please start by logging into https://my.scouting.org. Check your training completions. If something is missing, please contact your district training chair. If you're not sure who that is, contact the council training chair (see below, right side) to start. In general, we'll ask for proof in the form of a certificate or course director confirmation.

Training Recognition Knots

Have you seen adult leaders wearing the knots below? These knots are our way of recognizing leaders who've taken training and put it to use. Earning and wearing a knot is a great way to show Scouts and parents that their leaders have invested their time in learning how to run a strong Scouting program.



This knot (the "key") can be earned by a unit leader (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, etc.) after three years of service.



This knot can be earned by any registered adult leader in a unit. Requirements include two years of service.



This knot can be earned by any Den Leader from Lion through Webelos/AOL Requirements include one year of service.

Visit www.scouting.org/training/adult.aspx and scroll down to "Training Awards" to get the application forms with the requirements. Some of the requirements include helping your unit earn the Journey to Excellence award.



The Unit Leader's Award of Merit is also available. It can be earned by the unit leader at every level. Learn more at

www.scouting.org/awards/awards-central/unit-leader.

How to apply: Each form must be signed by your unit committee chair. Submit scanned or electronic applications to awards@mayflowerbsa.org. They will be routed for approval.

When are knots presented? They can be presented at any time of year. Knots can be given at a district dinner or roundtable, a unit event, or a regular unit meeting.

The success of every Scouting program depends on having well-trained leaders. They not only bring a quality program to their units, but they also have more fun doing it. Everything we do in Scouting has a purpose. Training is the key to recognizing, understanding, and achieving the purpose behind every activity. If you're a registered leader, there's a training course for you!

Our in-person courses are organized and taught by trained volunteers who have been "in your shoes." Live training is a great way to meet fellow leaders, share ideas, get answers to questions, and get a chance to practice key skills. We try to offer these courses at a variety of times and locations, but we can also add certain courses on demand, if requested.

We offer other courses periodically, too. You can also take many training courses online at https://my.scouting.org. For most Scouting positions, online training covers all the requirements to be considered "trained" for your position and wear the https://mww.mayflowerbsa.org/training.

Renew Youth Protection in 2020!

If you've been a registered adult for a few years, chances are you last took Youth Protection Training (YPT) in 2018 when the BSA required everybody to take the new version. YPT expires exactly two years after you take it, so pretty soon, a lot of people's YPT will expire.

If you wait till the end of the year, you'll risk letting it lapse-and you'll be scrambling to get into the online training system at the same time as thousands of others across the country. Save the trouble and renew sooner at https://my.scouting.org! You can also join us for in-person courses throughout the year (calendar at right).

Fixing Training Records

The records show that about half of our volunteers aren't yet fully trained for their Scouting positions... but we know more than a few people have courses missing from their records. Your district training chair and your unit's "key three" are able to enter most training courses, so please start there. You can provide proof in the form of a printout, certificate, or course director confirmation.

Credit for Training at Another Council

If you're not able to attend a Mayflower Council training course, you're welcome to take the same course with another council. However, this does not automatically mean your My. Scouting training record will be updated. Check with the person leading the training. If they send a report to the Mayflower Council office, your record will get updated. If they don't, it's your responsibility to show your completion certificate to someone who can add it to your record (see "Fixing Training Records" above).

Make sure you get the full training. For example, BALOO and IOLS both have a day and a half of required material with overnight camping (it's a national BSA syllabus we follow), and BALOO also requires an online component. Completing a shorter set of sessions can be a great way to learn skills, but it might leave you with more to finish.

Request a Training Course

If there's a training course you need and you don't see it listed on the schedule, please contact your district training chair or the council training chair (email at right). With enough advance notice, a suitable location, and a critical mass of participants, we can add most of the "classroom" courses on demand-especially YPT and Cub Leader Position-Specific. If you can get your fellow leaders to attend, we'll bring the training to you!

Recent Additions to the Calendar

Den Chief training: February 29 in Duxbury. This inperson, 2-1/2 hour course is a great way for your Scouts or Venturers to gain hands-on skills and build confidence to serve as Den Chiefs for a Cub Scout pack.

Renew Your YPT in 2020... and Hazardous Weather Training, Too!

We follow the national policy on youth protection training (YPT): it must be renewed every two years. 2020 will be a big year for renewals. **Don't let time run out!** Check your expiration date at https://my.scouting.org, then mark your calendar to retake the training so you'll stay current.

Also, consider renewing your Hazardous Weather training at the same time! After all...

- Hazardous Weather also expires after two years.
- If you're a <u>direct contact leader</u> (Den Leader, Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, ASM, etc.), this training is required to be considered "trained" for your position.
- At least one leader on any campout must have this.

The only way to take this training is online. It takes less than an hour. It's "SCO_800" in unit training records.

Hey Cub Scout Packs: **Host a Training Course!**

We hear a lot of reasons why adult leaders don't get trained. It's too far away. I won't know anybody there. I need child care. Or nobody invited me.

Here's a solution: host a training course right where your pack meets! Yes, you can absolutely do this. "Positionspecific training" takes 4 hours to complete, so find a time that works for you, contact the training team, and we'll send trainers. We just ask that you provide a free location, a "critical mass" of at least 6 participants, and a few weeks' notice so we can line up volunteer trainers and advertise the course to neighboring packs. We can also work with you to provide activities for Cub-age youth while their parents get trained.

A few packs have already done this, and they got great

Finally, don't forget to personally invite each of your leaders to this training event! It means a lot more when the invitation comes from a fellow leader within the pack who they know and trust.

Your Invitation to Wood Badge

Wood Badge is the pinnacle of adult leader training in the BSA—sometimes called the "Ph.D of Scouting." This course uses a fun pack and troop setting to teach leadership skills and challenge participants to put these skills into practice. All registered adult leaders are welcome and encouraged to take Wood Badge! The only prerequisite is to have completed the basic online or inperson training for your Scouting position (that is, earn the "Trained" patch).

Mayflower is part of a group of councils who have joined forces to be able to offer this 5-day training event at least once a year. Our next course will be March 27-29 and April 25-26, 2020. Spirit of Adventure Council is listed as the "host council," but this course belongs to all of us, and it will include staff and participants from Mayflower Council. Sign up soon! Spots are limited. Our Campaign for 2020: Training for Cub Scout Leaders

Did you know that Cub Scout leaders can complete all their "position-specific" training requirements online? In other words, you can earn the "Trained" patch and be considered trained for your position on your own time from the comfort of your home.

Despite the convenience of online training, though, fewer than half our Cub Scout leaders have completed basic training. Without training, leaders are missing out on ideas and resources that can help them do their jobs more effectively. So how can we "close the gap" and give every leader the training they deserve?

This will be a focus during the next year as we push to:

- · Raise awareness and promote the value of training.
- Get more people to take advantage of live training when we offer it.
- Add "on-demand" courses (see below).
- · Boost recognition for the packs who excel at training.

We can't do this alone, so we'll be asking for help from packs, unit commissioners, and more. Please help usgive every Cub Scout the gift of trained leaders!

Live Training / "Training on Demand"

Although many BSA training courses are available online, there's a lot of value to attending <u>live training</u>. Live training lets you interact with real humans, share ideas, ask questions, try hands-on skills, and have fun! When people attend our live courses, we get highly positive feedback that <u>it was worth their time!</u>

So consider taking the "live" version of your basic training instead of (or in addition to) taking it online. Many of our fall courses have already taken place, but more will be on the calendar for the spring. If no scheduled courses are available near you, we can also offer position-specific courses by request. Out of respect for our all-volunteer staff, we just ask that you provide several weeks' notice, a free place to meet, and at least five guaranteed participants from your pack or troop.

We recognize our Scouts for their achievements... Let's recognize our adult leaders, tool Registered leaders are eligible to receive the Den Leader, Cubmaster/ Scoutmaster, or Scouter (any position) training knots after becoming trained for their positions, serving for a certain period of time, and completing a few

additional requirements. Here's how to do it:

 Find the requirements. Go to www.scouting.org/training/adult and scroll down to "Training Awards" near the bottom.

- Complete the requirements, fill out the form, and get it signed (usually by your unit committee chair).
- Send the signed form to <u>awards@mavflowerbsa.org</u>.
 It will be routed to your district training chair for
 review and approval. You can also give the form
 directly to your district training chair.
- Tell us when you'd like to receive your knot. Some leaders like to get their knots at a district roundtable or the annual district dinner, but we can also give the knot to the unit to present at a pack/troop/crew event.

Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, and Crew Advisors can also receive the <u>Unit Leader Award of Merit</u> knot. See requirements and instructions at www.scouting.org/awards/awards-central/unit-leader.
