



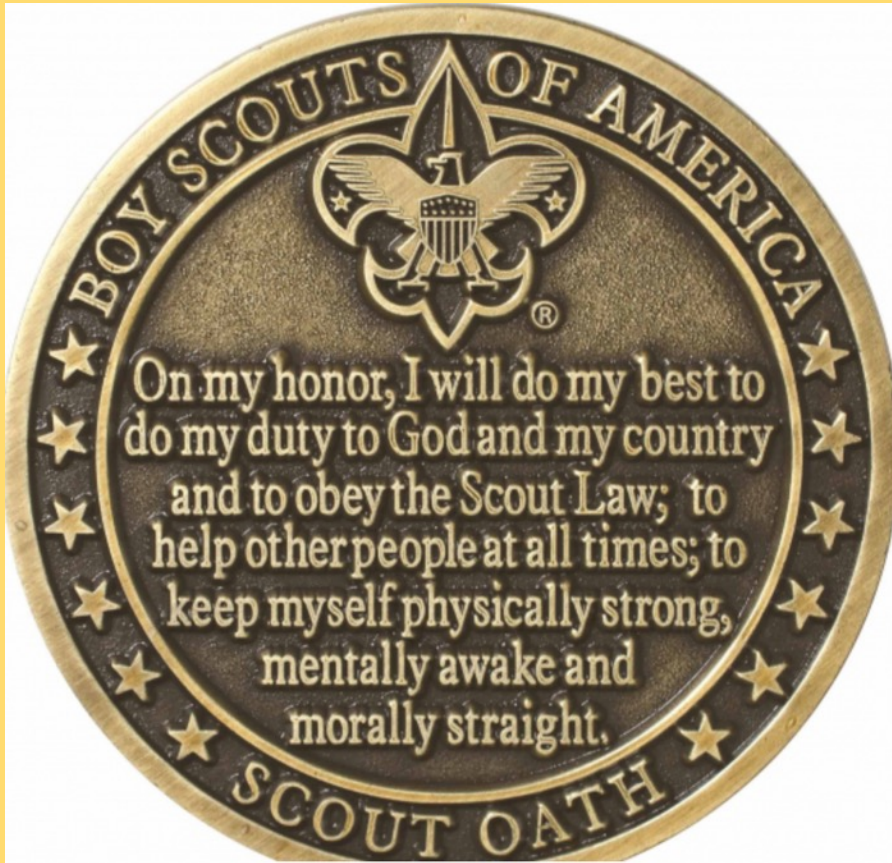

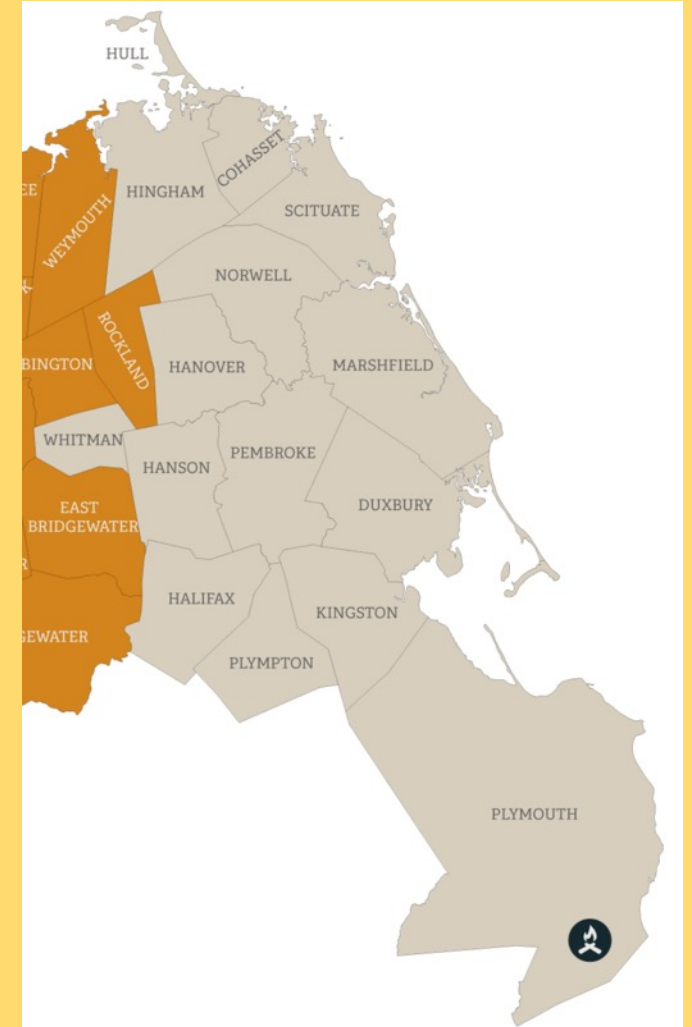

- **YPT – Complete BEFORE expiration Date!**
 - New Module due in June – recommend completing ALL modules by end of May if expiring in June or before
 - Remember – Youth Protection is MORE than completing YPT -
 - Do you ask “how are our Scouts doing?” at leader meetings?
- **2021 Charter Renewal** – “Full On-Line” planned – use electronic funds transfer
- **Duplicate ID Numbers** – a problem for YPT (and other) updating, and may result in leaders losing Scoutbook access:
 - Problem may show up as a “triangle exclamation point” on your Scoutbook account 
 - My.Scouting Roster shows charter registration ID
 - (Also check for correct email address)
 - Check Scoutbook and Volunteer Log-in the same as ID on Roster
 - Individual can correct using “manage member ID” Set the primary to the ID shown on the unit’s roster (recommend not deleting other ID’s yet)

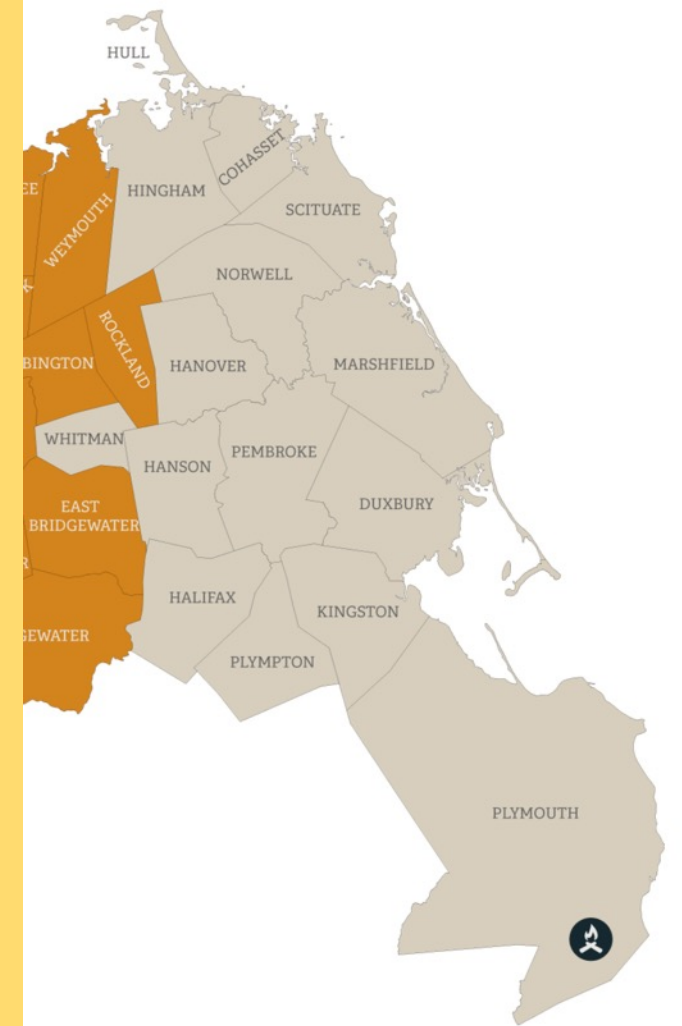

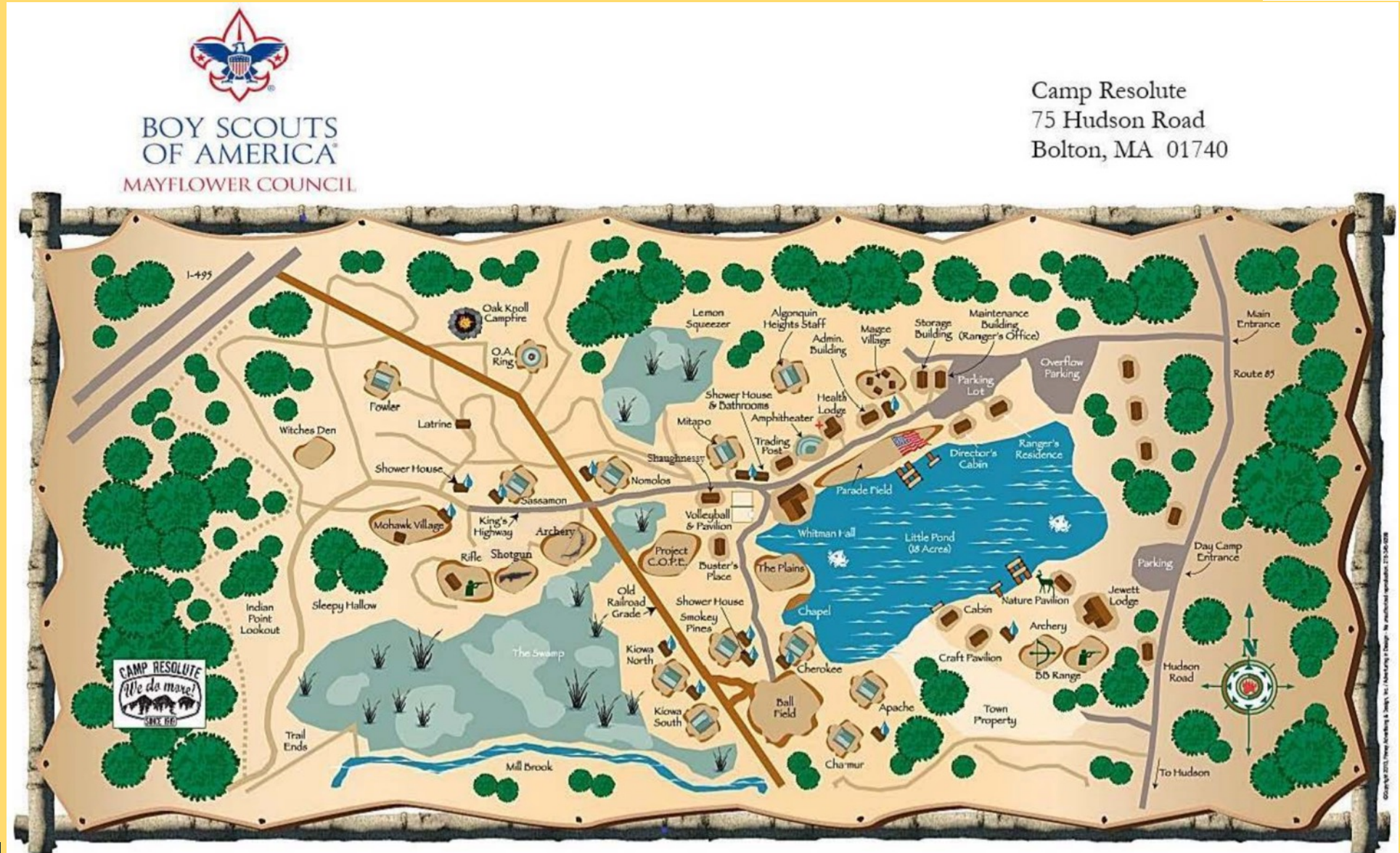

WHAT IS RESOLUTE BASE CAMP?

Resolute Base Camp is an outdoor adventure space designed for youth and adults of all ages to build character, explore nature, and create lifelong memories.

Base Camp offers families, scouting units, school groups, or corporate teams exciting and challenging instructor-led activities of their own choosing on weekends throughout the year.



RESOLUTE BASE CAMP PROGRAMS

A year-round program for scouts or units to participate in on THEIR schedule with fun activities and opportunities for advancement

A day-only program in summer camp format with more time for activities and advancement

RESOLUTE BASE CAMP OUTDOOR EXPERIENCE



WHAT IS OUTDOOR EXPERIENCE?

Outdoor Experience is an exciting new program offered on weekends throughout the year at Resolute Base Camp. It can be a fun and educational outing for all youth 6 - 21. We welcome families, groups, and units. All activities are run by trained and certified staff.

Units can work towards specific advancements and awards while non-scouts can participate in fun outdoor activities and skills development.





OUTDOOR EXPERIENCE CURRICULUM

The Outdoor Experience curriculum is designed with an eye towards advancement. Activities have been chosen and designed to assist units in providing access to resources that will foster the completion of rank requirements while participating in hands on activities. All activities are age-appropriate and age-engaging.



LOTS OF ACTIVITIES!

We offer a wide range of activities from pioneering to navigation to outdoor cooking. Learn how to fish, build a fire, try an orienteering course and throw a tomahawk.

As the weather turns warmer, we will add more activity areas including ropes courses, shooting sports and waterfront activities such as kayaking and canoeing.



COVID-19 PROTOCOLS



At Resolute Base Camp, we have put in place the following protocols to ensure that we offer a safe program:

- Social distancing of at least 6 feet is required during all Resolute Base Camp programs including seasonal aquatics activities.
- Face masks are required by all participants (youth and adults) at all times.
- All shared equipment will be sanitized after each use. Camp areas including bathrooms and changing rooms will be sanitized after each session.
- Hand sanitizing stations are located throughout the camp.
- Group sizes will not exceed 25. Participants assigned to a group must stay with the group and are not allowed to interact with other groups or visit non-designated areas.

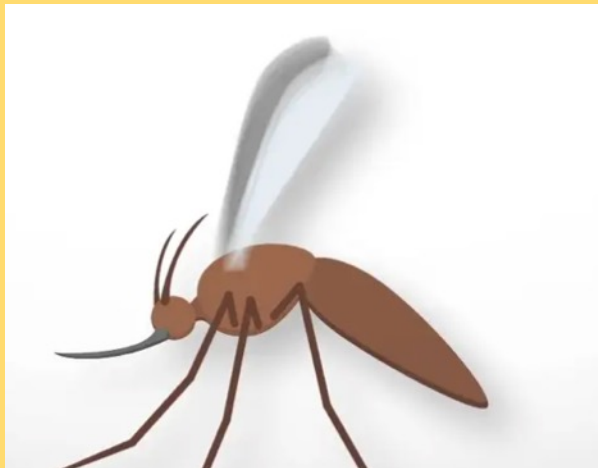

YPT FAQ clarification:

Unit leaders have asked for clarification of an entry in our Your Protection and Barriers to Abuse FAQs found at <https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/yp-faqs/>

o Q. Can a leader bring their Scouts BSA son or daughter to an opposite gender troop activity?

o A. No. Scouts BSA program integrity requires single gender units and single gender buddy pairs.

In our single-gender Scouts BSA Troops, program activities such as meetings and campouts (where there is an expectation the only attendees will be youth and their adult leaders) this barrier creates a safer and more productive environment by limiting participation to youth of only one gender. Other activities intended to include family members of both genders, such as award ceremonies, Courts of Honor, and fundraisers may include both male and female youth and adult visitors.

Disability, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Merit Badge Status

As previously announced, implementation of the new Disability, Equity, and Inclusion Merit Badge has been delayed. Excellent feedback on the initial draft of content and requirement was received from local councils and is being incorporated to ensure the best possible resource. No date of implementation is available at this time; additional information will be available as progress continues.
