# **MISSION STATEMENT & PROGRAM**

The Mission of the Mayflower Council, BSA is to serve others by helping to instill values in young people and in other ways prepare them to make ethical choices over their lifetime in achieving their full potential. The values we strive to instill are based upon the Scout Oath and Scout Law.



It is the purpose of the Mayflower Council to provide the program support needed by the volunteer leaders of the various Cub Scout packs, Scouts BSA troops, Venture crews, Explorer posts and Learning for Life groups in the communities we serve in the MetroWest and South Shore areas.

Mayflower Council continues to provide a robust scouting program at its three camps primarily because of its extensive fund-raising efforts. Parents, through a combination of the activity and summer camping fees, provide up to 33% of the total cost of the program provided to their children. The other 67% comes from the council's derived funding sources.

To maintain and grow the camping program it is important that families and Scouting units support and endorse our camps and send their Scouts to summer camp (Cub and Scouts BSA). Our camps are the lowest cost resident and day camps in the region due to the subsidies raised by the council professionals and volunteers.

Scouting youth's benefit enormously from the summer camp experience. They develop lifelong skills by pursuing merit badges in an outdoor educational environment. They learn to work with their peers, young adult counselors and full-time staff to gain the knowledge, interpersonal skills, and the experience to become better members of our society and in time great citizens all while having fun. Importantly, their summer camp experience helps them develop self-reliance, independence and how to overcome the obstacles in life through education, working with others and action.










# **SERVING ALMOST 7,000 YOUTH**

The Mayflower Council serves 62 cities and towns in Eastern Massachusetts and extends from Stow, MA in the north to Plymouth, MA in the South. This overall territory is divided into five distinct areas, known as Districts, to ensure resources are evenly distributed amongst the council's constituent communities.

Within and just outside the council's borders are three excellent council-owned camping properties: Camp Resolute in Bolton, MA, Camp Squanto in Plymouth, MA and the Nobscot Scout Reservation on the border of Framingham and Sudbury, MA. Combined, they constitute over 1,400 acres of beautiful forested land and open space, lakes and streams, making each one into a true 'Urban Oasis'.
